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When I applied for working as a volunteer in International Youth Club of Tallinn I didn't know almost anything about my project. I knew only what was on the project's description, because of strict deadlines I didn't have the chance to ask questions and talk with people related to the Club beforehand. So, the first time I talked with Eugenia, director of the project, my tutor and teacher in the Club was when I was already in Tallinn.

I still remember my first day in the Club. I was totally a fish out of water, too many new things at the same time, a new home in a new country and a new work all at the same time. But from the first time Eugenia helped me so much to feel comfortable. She explained me everything considering the work, she helped me to make children trust me, she helped me feel confident working there, she trusted me from the first moments.

I consider my project to be one of the best (if not the best) in Estonia (comparing with the projects of other volunteers I visited or heard about). Well organised in a way that you enjoy working, I was always waiting for Monday to go to work! I was working with Eugenia two days a week helping her with her courses taking part in group activities or working with children individually. One day a week I was leading the courses using reading materials and games I could find in the classroom. And finally I had a cooking class as well, very strange if you consider that my first time of real cooking was in Estonia!

So, after 6 months in Estonia and now that I'm back home I can make some conclusions concerning my work in IYC. Eugenia is amazing at her work, she has created a perfect learning environment making students enjoy learning a new language. She also supported me a lot and made me feel nice from the beginning. The project is great. Well organised activities, pleasant learning environment that helps students to learn having fun, convenient timetable. I already miss my time there, my students, the classes, great moments that complete my EVS puzzle.

To sum up, I undoubtedly recommend my project to young people that are thinking of the possibility of EVS. My English is not that good to describe my feelings and emotions connected with my work in IYC. But even if not my project, I would absolutely recommend EVS generally. EVS is one of the best experiences you can get in your life, it teaches you a lot about different cultures and people but also it teaches you a lot about yourself. During EVS you have the chance to challenge your beliefs and thoughts, you find out your strong and weak points, you become more tolerant towards different people.
